Your Time to Choose

We have almost 50 courses for students to choose from. The largest part of our provision is A levels, which are assessed by examinations at the end of two years of study. Our BTEC courses (offered as 1, 2 or 3 A level equivalent courses) involve more coursework than A levels, but also include some external assessment. We also have a brand new T level qualification.

All our courses are Level 3 qualifications and there are five routes you can choose from:

OPTION 1: 3 A level or A level equivalent subjects OPTION 2: 4 A levels or A level equivalent subjects OPTION 3: 1 BTEC National Diploma (equivalent to 2 A levels), plus 1 A level or A level equivalent course

OPTION 4: 1 BTEC Extended Diploma (equivalent to 3 A levels) OPTION 5: 1 T (Technical) Level (equivalent to 3 A levels)

Education & Early Years

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All our courses are Level 3 gualifications. As such, students must achieve a certain level of academic attainment in order to join the College. We have set our entry requirements at this level because we believe that if you have achieved these grades you are prepared for the challenge of advanced level study and should start your courses with us with confidence.

For entry in September 2024, there are five sets of criteria, depending on what programme of study you choose. Your choices are:

Standard 3 A level Programme:

The majority of our students will choose to study 3 A level subjects and will commit to these subjects for the full 2 years. Entry requirements for this programme are:

- At least two grade 6s at GCSE
- At least a further three grade 4s at GCSE
- You should have at least grade 4 in **BOTH** GCSE English Language AND Mathematics.

• Please note that there may be additional entry requirements specific to particular subjects - please check each subject listing on our website carefully to ensure you understand these entry requirements.

BTEC Level 3 National Diploma 3 (2 A level equivalent) plus 1 A level/A level equivalent:

The BTEC Level 3 National Diploma courses are equivalent to studying 2 A levels and have similar requirements. The only difference is that other courses equivalent to GCSE (e.g. BTEC First Awards and OCR Nationals) count towards the entry requirements. To support your future aspirations, you must choose one from the wide selection of A level/A level equivalent courses we have on offer to complement your BTEC level 3 National Diploma. You will need:

• At least two grade 6s at GCSE or merits on an equivalent course

• Check each subject listing on our website for any subject-specific grade requirements relating to the A level/A level equivalent you wish to study alongside the BTEC Level 3 National Diploma.

BTEC Extended Diploma (3 A level equivalent):

BTEC Level 3 National Extended Diploma courses are equivalent to studying 3 A levels, so have similar entry requirements to A levels. The only differences are that other courses equivalent to GCSE (e.g. BTEC First Awards and OCR Nationals) count towards entry requirements for BTEC and on some courses students are accepted with either English Language **OR** Maths at grade 4 (see below). You will need:

• At least two grade 6s at GCSE or merits on an equivalent course

• At least a further three grade 4s at GCSE or equivalent, including at least grade 4 in

5 T (Technical) Level (3 A level equivalent):

T levels are two-year technical courses, which are equivalent to three A levels and have a substantial industry placement alongside. You will need:

> • At least two grade 6s at GCSE or merits on an equivalent course

4 A level Programme:

Some very able students may choose to study 4 A level subjects. These students must commit to these 4 subjects for the full 2 years. This will include most students who choose to study A level Further Mathematics, who will pick Mathematics, Further Mathematics and two other subjects. Entry requirements for this programme are:

• At least five grade 7s at GCSE

• You should have at least grade 6 in GCSE English Language AND Mathematics.

 Check each subject listing on our website for any subject-specific grade requirements.

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• At least a further three grade 4s at GCSE or equivalent

• You should have at least grade 4 in **BOTH** GCSE English Language **AND** Mathematics.

• Some BTEC Level 3 National Diplomas have specific entry requirements: e.g. Science requires a minimum of two grade 4s in GCSE Science.

GCSE English Language **OR** Mathematics, with at least grade 3 in the other one. Students who have a grade 3 in one of these two key subjects will be required to retake this GCSE in addition to the BTEC Extended Diploma.

• Some BTEC Level 3 National Extended Diploma courses have specific entry requirements: Science requires a minimum grade 4 in Maths and two grade 4s in GCSE Science; IT requires a minimum grade 4 in Maths and IT/Computer Science; Art & Design requires a minimum grade 4 in an Arts-based GCSE.

• At least a further three grade 4s at GCSE or equivalent

• **BOTH** GCSE English Language **AND** Mathematics at grade 4 or above. Students wishing to move into teaching in the future also require at least a grade 4 in GCSE Science.



Applying to join the College could not be easier. Here is a step-by-step guide to the application process.

Step One

Apply online. You will be asked to create a new application first and then you can log back in at any time as a registered user. Please ensure you check your email regularly as this is how we will communicate with you.

Step Two

We will send you confirmation that your application has been received within two weeks.

Step Three

We will contact your school for a reference.

Step Four

Your application will be reviewed and if the information you have supplied indicates you are likely to meet our entry criteria, we will send you an invitation to attend an interview. We can only do this if you have supplied sufficient information in your application, so please take care to ensure we have all predicted or achieved grades and accurate personal information. If information is missing, the Admissions Office will contact you to ask for clarification.

Step Five

Keep an eye on your email inbox to make sure you don't miss any communications from us. Please note, we will process applications in the order we receive them, so there may be a short delay if you apply during a busy period.

Step Six

You will be invited to attend Welcome to College Day in the summer to get a taste of College life and attend taster sessions (see page 14 for more information).

Step Seven

We will write to you over the summer with details about enrolment, which will take place after GCSE results are known. You will be able to book an enrolment appointment on GCSE results day and when you attend you will need to bring evidence of all GCSE/level 2 results, including those qualifications taken early.

Step Eight

After enrolment, you will have a preparation for college day and then your studies can start. Attendance at the first week of lessons and evidence of achieving our entry criteria before the end of the first full week of teaching are both required in order for your enrolment to be complete.

Application Deadline is 31 March 2024.

Priority is given to students who apply before the deadline. Those who apply after the deadline may be put on a waiting list and enrolment will depend on whether there is space on the courses they wish to study.

PREPARING FOR INTERVIEW

Your Time to Excel

Every student who looks likely to meet our entry requirements will be invited into College for an interview. We conduct interviews because we want to give you the best advice we can. That means finding out a bit about you, what your interests are, what career ambitions you might have, and what level you are currently working at.

Here is what to expect:

• We will invite you (by email) to come into College for an interview. Your interview will last around 15 minutes. You are welcome to bring a parent/guardian along, but most students sit their interview alone. Dress Code is smart casual and most students wear school uniform. You will be given a date and time to attend.

• Our interviewer will tell you about some of the other opportunities available to you at the College. For example, we run some specialist enrichments, geared towards specific courses and careers, which might boost your prospects after College (see page 19).

Hampton Building is the main building on campus and was built in 1974 when the College opened. This houses a variety of subjects including Maths, Modern Languages, Humanities, Social Sciences and some of our Science subjects. Our lecture theatres are also in this building.

The College refectory is also in Hampton building and students can purchase a range of hot and cold food in there, including Halal and Kosher options. There is a Starbucks coffee bar there too.

Kitson building overlooks the College playing fields and the countryside beyond. Housing Psychology, Media and IT, the ground floor also boasts an extensive library and learning resource centre to aid students' independent study.

Blythe building lies behind the main building and houses English, Accounting, Business, Law and BTEC Business in recently refurbished classrooms.

5 Brueton building is where our Performing Arts courses live and we have specialist facilities to support Drama and Music studies, including a recording studio and theatre.

6 The Art & Design School has two floors dedicated to Art & Design students, including specialist photographic and ceramic facilities. The lower ground floor is the home of Health & Social **Care and Education & Early Years.**

8 The Hamilton Centre is the newest of our facilities and was built from 100% recycled materials in 2020. It houses Chemistry and Applied Science and boasts an additional IT study centre, where students take part in supervised study each week.



The College has a rear car park for students, who can apply for termly parking permits at a cost. We also have a covered bike shed at the front of the campus for those that opt to cycle to College.

The Terrace boasts a catering outlet and covered seating, with magnificent views of the College green belt site.



Malvern Building is the College's dedicated Additional Learning Support area. Students with additional needs are supported in this area and there is quiet study space for those that would benefit from an area away from the main library and learning resource centre. Sport and Health courses are also found here.

The Claire Hicks Sports Centre includes a large sports hall for basketball, netball and other recreational activities, a fitness suite (which students are able to use free of charge during college hours) and changing rooms.

Our Studio is used for presentations, quiet study and Friday prayers. We have a nearby multi-faith and no-faith room for students to use

All the offers we make are conditional on students getting the required grades. As such, enrolment takes place after you have got your GCSE results and this is what you can expect:

• We will write to you over the summer. The letter will tell you how to complete your enrolment and the enclosed Enrolment Guide should answer any questions you may have.

• GCSE results are published at the end of August. On the same day, you should upload your exam results and book your enrolment appointment online. Enrolment takes place in person at the end of August or beginning of September and you will be able to choose your appointment time.

• You should not book holidays at the end of August or beginning of September. Students who do not attend their enrolment interview will jeopardise their place at College unless they have informed us and arranged an alternative date.

• Make sure you have all the paperwork you will need to enrol. This includes evidence of your ID (passport or birth certificate) and evidence of all your exam results (including any taken early.) Bring those into College at your appointed date and time. These must be original documents and not photocopies.

• At your enrolment appointment, you will have a short interview to make sure your choice of subjects are still appropriate and that you meet the grade requirements. You will be given an enrolment confirmation letter, detailing your programme of study and the date of your Preparation for College Day in September.

• Preparation for College Day is a compulsory part of your enrolment and takes place on campus in the week of 2 September 2024.

• The start of full-time teaching will be on Monday 9 September 2024. It is absolutely vital that you start lessons on this date and we cannot accept absence for any reasons other than serious ill-health or an emergency.

A TYPICAL CODILIE BOB VYBBB

College life is different to school life. Students enjoy more freedom and are treated like adults, which means taking responsibility for your learning. Here's what you can expect from a typical week.

• The College day starts at 9.00am and goes on until 4.05pm (except for Thursdays when lessons finish at 3.30pm).

• Students undertake 4 1/2 hours of faceto-face teaching time each week for each subject they take. This equates to 13 1/2 hours for students on a 3 A level or BTEC equivalent programme or 18 hours for those studying 4 A levels.

• There is a 15-minute break in the morning and the lunch break is 40-45 minutes long. Lunch is staggered for Year 12 and Year 13 to ensure the refectory is not over-crowded.

• 30-minute intervention slots have been added to the timetable on set days to allow teachers to provide one-to-one support. You must make sure you are available at these times. Intervention exists to help students achieve their potential and is compulsory if you are directed to attend by your teachers.

• A dedicated 60-minute session for enrichments has been put into the timetable on Wednesday afternoons to ensure that all students can access a variety of enrichment options. • Time is also allocated for academic coaching seminars and supervised study each week and students will have regular one-to-one meetings with their academic coach to discuss progress.

• You will inevitably have time each week without timetabled commitments. Taking responsibility for your learning means you decide what to do with this time. Many students make use of the Learning Resource Centre to complete independent study, as we expect students to complete as much time working outside of lessons as you do face-to-face with your teachers.



YOUR TIME TO SET TO RES

The College is a stepping-stone for students to progress from school to the next phase of their education or career and we are proud to help our students achieve positive destinations. For most, that is university with an 85.9% acceptance rate being well above the UCAS national figures for all applicants.

Students progress to a variety of Higher Education providers. The percentage of students progressing onto Russell Group universities in 2022, including Oxford and Cambridge, was 19.7%, which is well above the national average of 16%. In 2022, three quarters of students attained places at their first-choice university.

Away from Higher Education, we assist students to progress onto other highly desirable destinations, including the very competitive higher apprenticeship and sponsored degree programmes and some go straight into employment. Statistics in 2022 were as follows:

Higher Education - 66.9% Paid Employment - 5.0% Gap Year before HE - 7.0% Apprenticeship - 2.8% Other - 3.0% Not recorded - 15.3%

Among the apprenticeship destinations in 2022 were Mott Macdonald, Rolls-Royce Holdings, Deloitte, KPMG, National Grid, West Midlands Ambulance Service and Zurich Insurance.

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All students benefit from expert careers guidance. The Careers department has achieved the Career Mark Gold award, (accredited 2023). Every student can expect the following support

- 1-to-1 advice and guidance
- University application and CV-writing support
- Support for apprenticeship and direct employment applications
- In-person and virtual work placement support
- Access to an annual Careers Fair with more than 80 institutions represented



For those who harbour ambitions to apply to Russell Group universities, including Oxford and Cambridge, or who are aiming for the most competitive courses, the Stretch & Challenge Programme ensures they have the best chance of success. This programme includes:

- Preparation for university tests and interviews
- A Stretch & Challenge Summer School in June

• Access to a virtual learning area with resources, activities and aptitude tests to strengthen university applications

• A dedicated programme for Oxbridge hopefuls

• A parents' evening to guide parents/carers on the university application process

SUPPORTING YOUR IL BARNING

Academic Coaching

Every student is allocated an academic coach. They will guide you in your studies, help you with university and job applications and be available for advice and support. You will have one-to-one appointments with your coach and attend compulsory weekly coaching seminars with other students to cover important issues like developing study

skills, online safety, financial management and British Values. You will also be introduced to the VESPA mindset, which is a way of learning that encourages students to achieve their potential. VESPA stands for Vision, Effort, Systems, Practice and Attitude.

Additional Learning Support

The College is committed to ensuring that students with Specific Learning Difficulties, disabilities or other additional needs, including those in care and who are young carers themselves, are treated fairly and all reasonable adjustments to provision are made to allow them to reach their full potential. Should you benefit from this support, our Additional Learning Team will offer you flexible support tailored to your individual needs.

Financial Support

Financial support is available to students whose household income is below £30,000. Bursaries and tailored support are available based on a students' individual needs and this can include paying for bus/rail passes for students, providing equipment or giving students access to the Free Meals scheme.



If you think this applies to you, look out for information in the Enrolment Guide we send out to offer holders in the summer so you know how to apply.

Student Welfare

The College has a team of Student Development Officers, who support students' social activities and wellbeing. They support the work of the Student Council student societies, the Student Health Ambassador Scheme and student events. The latter can include fundraising events and awareness campaigns. We have a dedicated member of staff to support your mental health while at College and we also offer a confidential counselling service.


